

The ACC.12 Scientific Session in Chicago is quickly approaching! This year, for the first time, the Fellow in Training (FIT) Forums will include a half-day session designed to bring together leaders from today and tomorrow in a way that will provide an unprecedented opportunity for current fellows to meet and interact with some of the world's greatest leaders in cardiology. This session, to be held from 12:15 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. on Saturday, March 24th, has been completely designed by current fellows to ensure it best meets the needs of FITs everywhere. It will cover topics including finding the right job, tips on securing early career funding, how social media is changing the way in which we practice and conduct research and a panel discussion on how technology will change the future of medicine. Finally, the session will conclude with an informal "fellows-only" meet-and-greet event that will provide FITs the opportunity to meet and interact with some of the most prominent leaders in cardiology today over light refreshments without a planned agenda.

Here are the details for Saturday's special FIT Forum:

Part I: Finding the Right Job

12:15 p.m. - 1:45 p.m. McCormick Place, Room N227b

A panel discussion among cardiologists representing different types of practices and career paths will feature representatives from academia, solo practice, hospital-owned cardiology groups, self-owned cardiology groups and nontraditional careers in this session. Each panel member will speak about the pros and cons of their type of practice and how health care reform has impacted their practice. After each member presents, there will be time for the audience to ask questions and compare different career options.

Part II: Launching a Successful Career

2:00 p.m. - 3:15p.m.

This session will focus on the skills and resources needed to launch a successful career in cardiology. It will begin with a talk by C. William Balke, MD, FACC from UCSF on early career funding opportunities. Dr. Balke has written and spoken extensively on this topic and he will provide important information on ways to secure research funding that can lay the foundation for a successful career. Bob Harrington, MD, FACC, from the Duke Clinical Research Institute, will follow with a talk on something he is very passionate about: the use of social media to



Guidance for the First Steps of Your Cardiology Career at ACC.12

As a Fellow in Training (FIT), you will soon embark on a very exciting, but potentially daunting, stage in your career. Confronted by challenges posed by the Board exams, interviews, career options and financial planning, FITs will find valuable direction and insight from a lineup of experts in the Fit Forum IV: Guidance for the First Steps of Your Cardiology Career during ACC.12 in Chicago.

Navigating the course to fellowship can be intimidating as FITs are forced to tackle several important responsibilities, while simultaneously making decisions that will have long-term career implications. To assist FITs in confidently transitioning from training to their chosen career path, the session's featured speakers will provide both general advice as well as specific tips that are usually not significantly covered during fellowship training.

This career session will provide FITs with a foundation for proactively preparing for their future, as a series of five speakers discuss passing the ABIM's Board examination, interviewing tips, contract negotiation and sound financial planning.

With registration for cardiovascular disease Boards approaching, **David E. Winchester**, **MD**, from the University of Florida and **Joseph G. Murphy, MD**, **FACC** from Mayo Clinic will present two perspectives on preparing and successfully passing the exams, including explaining the material and format one can expect to encounter. The presentations will also describe how to focus theoretical cardiology knowledge into the correct response and will shed light on how cardiology Board-type questions are chosen and how cardiovascular question writers think.

After FITs determine their desired professional path, they are met with many options for subsequent courses of action which will be discussed by **Susan F. Childs, FACMPE,** founder of Evolution Healthcare Consulting, in her presentation *Interviewing Tips and Contract Negotiations*. Topics will include what prospective employers are

looking for, what to ask during the interview, salary structure options, risks and more. Ms. Childs will furnish real-life considerations that will help FITs make educated decisions about practices he or she may be considering working with in the next steps of their career.

contact to protect you as you sign on the dotted line," says Ms. Childs.

A new in-practice cardiologist will also face many challenges as they start the financial planning process. Potential solutions, as well as suggestions for prioritizing financial needs during fellowship, will be presented by financial advisors **a** and **Anders T. Ramstad, ChFC, CLU** of Finity Group, LLC in *Financial Planning for Future Cardiologists*.

"This session will assist in narrowing the gap between the 30,000 hours of training on how to be a cardiologist and the typical five minutes of education on what to do with the money they make as a cardiologist. In our experience, the most difficult task involves prioritizing the unavoidable list of competing goals," says Mr. Merrill.

A cardiologist's financial plan should not be structured the same as "average" Americans, according to Mr. Merrill. In this presentation, FITs will learn how to develop a strategy that appropriately prioritizes their financial needs and maximizes the use of their disposable income. Basic tax minimizing techniques, fundamentals of risk management and asset protection, along with other investment principles will also be highlighted.

FITs are invited to take full advantage of the forum through its discussion style structure that allots time for questions and answers between speakers.





Researchers all over the world are all vying to have their manuscripts accepted for publication in the most prestigious medical journals. During the FIT Forum III, How to Write and Evaluate Medical Journal Articles, Anthony DeMaria, MD, MACC,

Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of the American College* of *Cardiology*, will explain the do's and don'ts of how to write publishable papers. As Editor-in-Chief of JACC for 10 years and author of over 400 papers, Dr. De-Maria offers a plethora of experience and knows what reviewers and editors look for, the most important points and strengths of a manuscript, as well as what tends to weaken a paper and will ultimately lead to rejection.

Attendees will learn strategies for designing an excellent research study from the go, as well as tips for presenting and analyzing the data, crafting the discussion and presenting the conclusions with informative figures and legends.

Tips on how to revise your manuscript if it's not up to par will be presented by **Jagat Narula**, **MD**, **FACC**, Editor-in-Chief of *JACC: Cardiovascular Imaging*, who has authored more than 300 research papers.
